

Message from the University President

My beloved UNC community - students, parents and alumni; my colleagues in the administration, faculty and staff; to the Hernandez-Sison family who have graced us with their presence, guests and friends, a great, grand and glorious day to all of us!

Many fell in love at first sight and took an oath of love forever, thus sticking to UNC from Kinder to Graduate School, and spreading love from parents to all siblings and across generations. What is it about UNC that makes the heart throb? That brings us to this year's Anniversary theme. The theme for our 75th Anniversary is: UNC Celebrating with Gratefulness and Hope. Let's begin with gratefulness for there is so much to be grateful for.

In Jim Collins' book, "Built to Last", he traced the common thread among companies that had lasted 100 years and more. He said that in a world of constant change, the fundamentals are more important than ever. That is by being clear about the institution's core values and guiding purpose, the institution thrives because of what it stands for. We shall be forever grateful to Don Jaime Hernadez. He clearly defined what UNC education is about. What UNC stands for. Non scholae sed vitae. Not of school, but for life. For 75 years, UNC lived by its motto and honed thousands of students to seek knowledge to live purposeful lives. While UNC is now one of the 6 schools under the Ayala - Yuchengco Education partnership known as the IPeople Educational System, it remains faithful to Don Jaime Hernandez's vision and legacy.

In February 1948, Dr. Hernandez together with other prominent Bicolanos, formed the Nueva Caceres College. Its founder, Don Jaime Hernandez Sr., saw the need for higher education in the Bicol region. He believed that access to education was a fundamental right and that it was essential for the region's development. Founded almost in the same year Naga, a post-war chartered city, was created, the University of Nueva Caceres, then called Nueva Caceres Colleges, played a crucial role not only in the rehabilitation of the shattered regional economy but also in healing the wounds of despair.

As noted by well renowned historian Danny Gerona, UNC as one of the earliest non-sectarian educational institutions, offered an alternative to Catholic schools which for centuries comprised the limited choices that Bikolanos aspiring for higher education were faced with. As a non-sectarian school, it provided educational opportunities to various sectors of the region without prejudice to religious affiliations.

Thus UNC flourished - starting with the Liberal Arts, Commerce, Education, and High School in 1948; and the opening up of the Elementary Department in 1949. The 1950s saw the birth of the College of Law in 1951 and Graduate Studies in 1953.

The school's elevation to the exalted status of a university, in 1954, the first in southern Luzon, and among the few in the entire country, indeed offered not only a glimmer of normalcy but of progress as well, inasmuch as university degrees then were generally available only in Manila.

Its foundation has likewise inspired a sense of cosmopolitanism, as it opened a wellspring of quality degree programs as well as far ranging opportunities for professional advancement among the Bicolano youth. Hence, from a few courses in Liberal Arts, Commerce, Education and high school, UNC grew into a vibrant university, offering degrees in graduate school, law, engineering, nursing, secretarial courses among others. As pioneers in these various fields, its graduates soon joined the ranks of its renowned alumni, worked at the helm of various industries and companies, thus further boosting the reputation of UNC as the region's leading provider of quality education. The university has come a long way since its inception and has scaled up further under Dr. Dolores H. Sison's leadership as 2nd President of the University in 1977. She already envisioned UNC as a global learning institution. The UNC community witnessed her passion to continually prepare the University for the challenges of the 21st century.

At the turn of the millennium, we welcomed new academic departments such as Computer Studies in 2000; Architecture in 2004; and Criminology in 2012.

The year 2015 ushered a new era for UNC, as it came into the family of Ayala Education. With Mr. Alfredo I. Ayala as the third University President, the curricula were tailor-fitted to industry needs such that we produce graduates who are trained to address the demands of compelling careers. The biggest challenge of this period is the transition of the K-12 program, expected to impact on higher education enrollment. We credit the leadership of Mr. Fred Ayala that UNC took the transition period as an opportunity to introduce an innovative SHS curriculum known as SHS LINC- an industry driven curriculum. Thus, UNC population expanded rather than contracted during the said transition period.

In 2019, UNC welcomed another transition - it became part of the iPeople Schools under the Ayala-Yuchengco Education Partnership, and its vision as articulated by Dr. Rey Vea, iPeople President, has been elevated to a higher purpose of creating relevance and impact to the bigger community as enunciated in iPeople's vision of "being the biggest* and the best performing** Philippine education system by 2030." A University Presidency they say is a destiny. It is my honor to be at UNC's helm on its Diamond Jubilee. The second part of the theme for this milestone anniversary is: Celebrating

The recent pandemic, notwithstanding the technological accomplishments our world has achieved, reveals the enormous vulnerability of mankind. 
